




Elk Grove Regional Park

WALKING NEW MEXICO







Albuquerque was the start and end of a walking trip that covered north, south, east and west of this beautiful state.

Eight California walkers and 40 other folks from around the country spent ten days on a Tater Tour. The Sticks members included myself, Janet Riley, Kim Dagan, Dana Beales, Charlotte Henshaw, Susan Profito, Dan Robinson and past member Nancy Mitchell. We were only out numbered by 9 walkers from Washington.

Ten walks included the largest city of Albuquerque, Santa Fe (the State Capitol and major Art Center), and smaller rural towns. The town of Roswell known as an alleged UFO crash site (the actually site is 75 miles away) provided us with ufology and alien-themed and spacecraft iconography.

A highlight for me and others was the day spent at Carlsbad Caverns National Park in the Guadalupe Mountains. The cave is known for its many calcite formations and stalactites. One of the most accessible and best-preserved cave complexes in the world. Some of the group were able to acquire tix's for a special tour of the King's Palace, "magnificent"!

The last day we visited Salinas Pueblo Missions National Monument a complex of Spanish missions. Once thriving Native American trade communities of Tisa and Tompiro language-speaking Pueblo people inhabited these remote frontier areas of central New Mexico.

The State of New Mexico has a population of a bit over two million. Sacramento County population is estimated at 1.5 million.

ROAD TRIP REPORT

CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, CHICO ROAD TRIP

The only time I went to CSU, Chico was during my freshman year of college. A group of students from CSU, Sacramento took a bus to attend the football game between our two schools. My strongest memory of the trip was the intense cold during the game. Several of us missed the entire second half because we went back to the bus to warm up! I never saw the campus.

I was excited, therefore, to return to the campus in March and to explore it fully with a walk. The Central Coast Beach Boardwalkers maintain this walk through an OSB, giving us an opportunity for a University stamp in our efforts to complete the special program that they offer.

Barbara Nuss, Josie and Dave Barnes, Paul and I were the small group who ignored the threat of rain in the afternoon. Just as we were looking at our directions to begin, our niece Sarah and her boyfriend Nick joined us. What a delightful surprise! We had planned to meet them for lunch, and we were thrilled that they wanted to walk with us, also.

Sarah has been living in Chico for 8 years while she attended CSUC and continued as she began her career as a nurse. It was fun to have a local guide to keep us heading in the right direction and to share

inside information. When we approached "Stonehenge," a creative arrangement of rock columns, Sarah shared the student lore: if you touch one of the stones before an exam, you'll have good luck on the test.

As we walked across the footbridge over Big Chico Creek, Sarah told us that there are nine footbridges on campus that cross the creek. I loved the idea of walking across a creek on my way to and from classes, as well as the beautiful brick buildings throughout the campus and the striking public art.

The walk continued past Bidwell Mansion, the jewel of Bidwell Mansion State Historic Park. John Bidwell was deeply involved in the development of his adopted state, its agriculture and the city of Chico. His 3-story, 26-room mansion boasted running water, flush toilets, modern gas lights, and an air cooling system. A guided tour is required; Paul and I visited several years ago and recommend a day trip. It is a fascinating look at a part of California's early history. After the tour, a lovely lunch awaits just a couple of blocks away at Tres Hombres.

Thank you, Ty and Ginger Fredriks, for giving us the opportunity to explore another University campus, to earn a stamp in our program book, and to participate in another road adventure!



BY FERRY: I will meet walkers by the Vallejo Ferry Landing. Walkers coming on the Vallejo Ferry should take the 9:15 AM ferry from Vallejo and will arrive at the Ferry Building at 10:15 AM. Drive to the Vallejo Ferry Terminal, 289 Mare Island Way, Vallejo, CA 94590, Ferry tickets are \$9.30 for adults and \$4.60 for seniors (\$18.60 or \$9.20 for round trip). Parking is \$8.00 (this is old information - could not find current prices online) for up to 24 hours



ARRIVING ON BART: Walnut Creek BART Station: 200 Ygnacio Valley Rd, Walnut Creek, CA 94596. Parking is \$3 a day (do not leave valuables in your car). Click here for BART Fares: https://www.bart.gov/tickets.

Take BART Yellow S around 9:20 AM

Get off at Embarcadero Station around 10 AM. Turn LEFT on Market Street to walk 2 1/2 blocks to the Ferry Building. I will be near the Vallejo Ferry Landing, Gate E.

DRIVING: Take I-80 W across the Bay Bridge. Take Exit 2C on RIGHT at Fremont Street just after crossing the bridge. LEFT on Fremont at the bottom of the ramp. Fremont becomes Front Street after crossing Market. Continue on Front Street about 4 blocks to Clay Street. RIGHT on Clay. Garage will be immediately on LEFT.

SODA POP CAN TABS

At the registration check-in table you may have noticed a bucket full of pop tabs! Gail Samcoff collects and makes sure these get to the Ronald McDonald House. They still collect *pop tabs* to help raise funds for their programs that provide family-centered care to families and children. They collect tabs instead of entire aluminum cans because it's more hygienic to store tabs than cans and collection and storage is generally easier due to the small size of the tab alone. There is also a higher concentration of aluminum in the tab itself, so those little tabs can really add up! *YOUR POP TOP DONATIONS ARE ALWAYS WELCOME*.

VOLKSMARCH
